PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Pulkit Desai

I want to thank the board members for all of the work they do for the LPPOA, and their families for supporting them. I'd also like to thank our community members for coming and staying for most of the last month's board meeting. While it was a long meeting, it was important for us to get to a determination on the DCA complaint, fees, invoices and collections.

The DCA complaint was filed in the summer of 2020 by a few members of our community, some who later became elected board members. From the date the complaint was filed until February 9th of this year, the DCA took no action and passed no judgement against the LPPOA. At the February board meeting nearly every board member voted to retain the same fee structure set for 2020, which was \$315 for membership with an option to OPT OUT of membership at \$115. The next day the LPPOA received an order from the DCA which stated that the LPPOA must recognize voting rights for all, according to PREDFDA, regardless of our fee structure. DCA

had no objection to our 2020 fee structure; which we had retained for 2021. Many board members felt the way to comply with the DCA was the establishment of a single fee structure of \$195 for membership, which includes all privileges for all 2200 members who join. This means all members in good standing can use all facilities when available, have a right to vote and run for board positions. When I describe membership in good standing, I mean that all dues, past and current are paid and up to date.

Invoices for 2021 and Membership

Invoices will be mailed in a few weeks. The due date for 2021 membership fee is May 31st, 2021. You don't have to wait for your invoice to arrive, in fact we encourage you to pay online. All property owners, in good standing, will automatically receive 4 membership cards. If your household has more than 4 members, you will receive additional cards for verified household members.

Collections

We will be sending invoices and notices for collections to members who have not paid last year's (2020) invoice. Please take a moment to review your notice as it fully explains the importance of prompt payment. Please do not ignore it. We understand that you may have difficulty paying, so we will provide a contact for you to call to make payment arrangements that work for you. June 30, 2021 is the deadline to pay your past due invoices, after that we cannot extend deadlines any further and you will risk being turned over to collections for non-payment. I urge you to reach out to the contact we provide for you to work out an affordable payment plan.

Rumors

There are ongoing rumors in our community that the newly elected board members want to get rid of the lake. This is completely untrue. It makes absolutely no sense to me that people would believe that.

Whoever is saying this is wrong on so many levels and it is beyond my comprehension as to why this rumor continues. We are truly invested in our community and will continue to do all that we can to ensure that it flourishes.

CARNEGIES MAID

We read Carnegies Maid by Marie Benedict.

If you had an opportunity to change your fate by pretending to be someone else- would you do it?

This is the fictional story of a young Irish immigrant woman. She seizes an opportunity that changes the course of her life. Her story meshes with the real historical figure, Andrew Carnegie and his rise to incredible wealth with the Pittsburgh Carnegie Steel Company. The author tries to answer the question of why Carnegie was inspired to give away his wealth in his later years. It also touches upon the 'double lives' many people lead.

We begin in 1863 Pittsburgh PA and some interesting facts were woven into the story.

-This was a time of President Lincoln, nearing the end of the civil war and also the beginning of the Gilded Age. Per Britannica.com: Gilded Age, period of gross materialism and blatant political corruption in U.S. history during the 1870s that gave rise to important novels of social and political criticism. The period takes its name from the earliest of these, The Gilded Age (1873), written by Mark Twain in collaboration with Charles Dudley Warner. The novel gives a vivid and accurate description of Washington, D.C., and is peopled with caricatures of many leading figures of the day, including greedy industrialists and corrupt politicians.

- -Insider trading was not illegal then and a big part of Carnegies initial success.
- -If a man was drafted in wartime, he could pay someone to take his place, it was a common practice.

Book Club (Cont.)

- -One of the slum areas in Pittsburgh was called Slabtown, the smoke and soot permeated everything and living conditions were harsh and extremely different from the wealthier areas.
- -Catholics were quite discriminated against at that time.
- -This area of southwestern PA was a bit of ahead of the country in freeing slaves and the author touches upon this history with one of its characters, Mr.Ford, the cook.
- -Andrew Carnegie donated money to build over 2,000 libraries around the world, as well as funding numerous universities and grants.
- -This is an interesting summary of Carnegie from a book review on 'Andrew Carnegie' by David Nasaw.

Those who would read this robust 801-page reflection will marvel at Carnegie's will, drive, intellect, vision and ability during the embryonic capitalistic industrial age that was the turn of the 20th century. Author David Nasaw also addresses Carnegie's ruthlessness and

ignorance when it came to the thousands of poor laborers who made his wealth possible. This will forever be the paradoxical position of Andrew Carnegie: The man who was an insightful and kind philanthropist also played to win at all costs.



The Water Vitality and Management Committee recently met with Chris Hanlon, who treats the lake against algae blooms. Some of the points covered were:

- Chris regularly inspects the lake as well as treating it; he told us we are not now at risk for the HABs (harmful algae blooms) that Lake Hopatcong has had.
- "Can we have a green lawn without making our lake green?" should be our slogan to encourage all residents to avoid both phosphorous and nitrogen in their lawn fertilizers so we don't have green algae on Lake Par. Even if we don't have property at lakeside, the runoff from our fertilizers will end up in the lake. We need to check with our lawn services and landscapers and let them know that phosphorus and nitrogen are not necessary for lawns in this area, and they can cause algae blooms.

Spring is here! Hope we can get out more and see each other more and enjoy a clean lake!



If you have a Kayak that you plan to use on Lake Parsippany, make sure to get a Boat Tag when you pay your dues.






BOAT AUCTION

New Jersey's opening day of trout season is April 10th at 8am. The lake will be stocked with trout on April 3rd or very close to that date. There will be no fishing from 7am on the day the trout are

stocked until April 10th at 8am. A mass email will be sent after the trout are stocked. Reminder, we must follow all New Jersey's angling regulations.

We will have the annual, "Winnie Opening Day of Trout Season Contest" on April 10th. The contest starts at 8am and ends at 4pm. You must signup for the contest. You can email the fishing club or signup the day of the contest. It usually costs \$1.00 to be in the contest but this year, it is free and everyone that enters the contest will be entered in a raffle for a \$25 gift card for Dick's sporting goods. You have to signup and fish on opening day to qualify for the raffle. Someone will be at the boathouse to check in and weigh all the trout that will be caught that day. Even if you do not catch some trout, stop by and have a coffee or a hot chocolate. There will be snacks like munchkins and or cookies.
